1	Regards With Regard to/In Regard to	A courteous expression of good wishes, often used in formal correspondence. Example: "Give my regards to the team." 6	Lose Loose	A verb, signifying the failure to keep or maintain something. Example: "Did you lose your keys?" An adjective, describing something not rigidly fastened or securely attached. Example: "Your shoelaces look like they're loose."
7	Their There They're	A possessive pronoun, indicating ownership by a group. Example: "Their sales figures surpassed expectations." A location or a point in a presentation. Example: "The solution is over there." A contraction of "they are," providing a concise way to express actions or characteristics of a group. Example: "They're implementing a new software system."
8	Your You're	A possessive pronoun, indicating ownership or association. Example: "Your feedback is valuable." The contraction of "you are," serving as a concise way to express actions or qualities. Example: "Do you know when you're going to submit the report?"
9	Farther Further	Physical distance, making it relevant when discussing the reach or extension of a product or service. Example: "The location is farther than we thought." A greater degree, often used when delving deeper into topics or extending investigations. Example: "Let's discuss this further."
